Trio Retire from Command Counsel-- Saunders, Klatsky and Brognano

On August 3, three experienced and valuable members of the Office of Command Counsel took the giant step into retirement. **Holly Saunders, Nick Brognano,** and **Steve Klatsky** depart the AMC Legal community leaving a deep and lasting impression on all those with whom they worked for all these many years.

Holly Saunders worked in the Legal Office for 23 years, the last five as the Executive Officer, providing exceptional service to all in the AMC career program. As the office of Command Counsel leaped into the era of computers, Holly became the leader in the introduction of the technology that improved the efficiency of all. Among her most important endeavors, Holly was the single point person for the administration of the annual AMC Continuing Legal Education Program.

Steve Klatsky began work in the Office of Command Counsel on December 19, 1974, when he was a JAG Captain, sponsored by CPT (soon to be Command Coun-

sel) Ed Korte. Steve was the lead AMC labor counselor when that program accelerated after the Civil Service Reform Act of 1978; started the AMC Labor Counselor Newsletter long ago, which evolved to the AMC Command Counsel Newsletter on the Web in 1997; and was the chair and "emcee" of the AMC CLE for the last five years. He was a leader in the field of Alternative Dispute Resolution.

Nick Brognano came to HQ AMC in 2001 as Fiscal Law attorney, bringing his legal talent, unique sense of humor, and more to a very difficult and complex area of the law. Prior to that, he worked for AMC as a contracts attorney at Vint Hill Farms Station. Nick also worked for several other DOD component legal organizations, beginning his career with the Air Force in his hometown of Rome, New York.

Acting Command Counsel **Kathi Szymanski** presided over an emotional retirement ceremony on August 1, as this transition took place. "These three people

have been with the Office of Command Counsel for some 55 years. When you control the outcome of the CLE, write the Newsletter, interpret the Anti-Deficiency Act, and apply the AMC Attorney Career Program to and for a Legal community of 250, you do important work. Holly, Nick and Steve have provided legal services, guidance, and representation that will be impossible to replace and duplicate. Personally, I want to thank each of you for the dedication, work ethic and the desire to work as a team. AMC thanks you".

I honestly did not realize I was beginning a career. I've spent almost 31 years with the Army Materiel Command as an MP Officer, JAG, and civilian attorney.
